SAA Rtn Jim collected money from the following members:

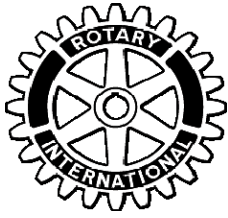
PP Al Gorman welcomed his guest to the Club & 1st day at Memorial Hospital, hopefully future Rotarian.

He is a 2007 graduate of Fremont Ross High School.



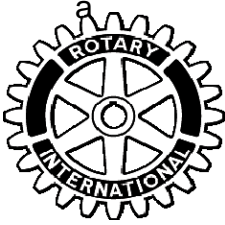

PRESIDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Helene made the following announcements:

- 1) Students of the Month Recognition (cont.) – Rtn Mike Gabel presented Certificates of Recognition to 2 students from September 2007. The students introduced themselves, and thanked the club and their sponsors. *Details of these students will be published at a later date.*
- 2) Induction of New member – Gregory W. Kuns. Greg was introduced by his sponsor, Rtn Jim Yeager. *Greg's short intro & picture will be published at a later date.*
- 3) Misty Meadows/Camp Fire Updated by IPP Kay Reiter – Camp Fire received unsolicited donations \$1,000 from members after last week's meeting (Oct 1). Unfortunately on the same day shortly after meeting, there was a lightning strike at the premises. Camp Fire lost all electronic equipment, phone system and the well pump. Luckily all these were covered by insurance, so it wasn't a total loss.

PROGRAM OF THE DAY

Speaker – *Harold Brown, Lt. Colonel, US Air Force (Retired), 1943-1965*
Topic – "Tuskegee Airman of WWII"

President Helene invited PP Al Gorman to introduce the guest speaker, Harold Brown, who flew with the famed "Tuskegee Airmen" fighter pilot group in World War II.

In the early 1930's, when Mr. Brown was 13 years old, he gave up piano playing to pursue his love of airplanes. At age 16, after saving up \$35, he took four flying lessons.

After WWII began, 200 colleges, including 6 predominately black colleges, participated in the Civilian Pilot Training program. "Tuskegee Airmen" refers to all who were involved in the so-called "Tuskegee Experiment," the U.S. Army Air Force's program to train African Americans to fly and maintain combat aircraft. The Tuskegee Airmen included pilots, navigators, bombardiers, maintenance and support staff, instructors, and all the personnel who kept the planes in the air.

The black airmen who became single-engine or multi-engine pilots were trained at Tuskegee Army Air Field (TAAF) in Tuskegee Alabama. The first aviation cadet class began in July 1941 and completed training nine months later in March 1942. Thirteen started in the first class. Five successfully completed the training, one of them being Captain Benjamin O. Davis, Jr., one of the few African American West Point

graduates. His father Benjamin O. Davis, Sr. was the first black general in the US Army.

After Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt went on a flight piloted by an African American in 1941, African Americans became allowed to fly to serve their country.

Flying escort for heavy bombers, the 332nd flew P-51 Mustang and racked up an impressive combat record. The Allies called the Airmen "Redtails" or "Redtail Angels", because of the distinctive crimson paint on the vertical stabilizers of the unit's aircraft. The Airmen's success during World War II – not losing a single bomber to enemy fire in more than 200 combat missions – is a record unmatched by any other fighter group.

Brown continued his talk by telling the audience his personal war stories, including that he was shot down twice in his flying career.

After WWII, Brown spent 23 years in postwar military service, today lives in Columbus, Ohio.
